Time for the Christmas Bird Count!

It's that time again—time for the 122nd annual Audubon Christmas Bird Count (CBC)! The CBC is conducted between December 14 and January 5 each year, and the St. Lucie Audubon Society count will be held **Saturday, December 18, 2021**, rain or shine. The count begins just after sunrise and lasts for a minimum of 8 daylight hours. Nocturnal birding, or owling, is optional for any team that wants to look for nocturnal birds on count day. Whether the teams will meet at the Oxbow Eco-center after the count has yet to be decided.

Since the CBC began over a century ago, it has relied on the dedication and commitment of volunteers. You do not have to be an expert birder to participate on a count team. If you would like to join a CBC team, contact our local compiler, Ed Bowes via email at <u>slacbc2010@gmail.com</u> or via phone at 772-607-4028. Participate in the CBC and contribute to science that has been helping birds for over 100 years!

Project Feederwatch starts November 13th! You can count the birds that visit your backyard feeders all winter and report these counts to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. There is a fee of \$18 to participate for the 2021-2022 season. For more information and to join, visit this <u>link</u>.

The Florida Keys Hawkwatch

raptor count is wrapping up at Curry Hammock State Park just north of Marathon. This year, they counted Swallowtailed Kites for the first time, totaling 1619 kites! You can follow the count on Facebook or visit the Web page <u>here.</u>

This year's count included 3227 Peregrine Falcons, 4695 Broad-winged Hawks, and 3555 Osprey!

Feathered Friends

It's mid-autumn and our migrants have been arriving since August. Raptors and passerines have passed through St. Lucie County on their way south. Some do linger, much to the delight of local birders. One of these travelers is the Blue-gray Gnatcatcher.

A year-round resident in north Florida, this tiny bird only visits our area in the winter. The Blue-gray Gnatcatcher (*Polioptila caerulea*) is between 3.5 and 4 inches long! This gnatcatcher also prefers dense vegetation high in trees, so finding it is literally a "pain in the neck."

When foraging, gnatcatchers flick their tail from side to side to flush insects. They also tend to vocalize frequently, which is the easiest way to locate these tiny birds. Calls tend to be a highpitched, sharp, nasal, mewing "zee" or "chay" coming from high in a tree. You can hear a variety of their calls at this <u>link</u>. Use your binoculars to watch the ends of the tree branches for movement once you hear the calls.

Blue-gray Gnatcatchers are a pale blue-gray color with light gray underparts. The top of their tail is mostly black with white edges, while the underside of the tail is white. They show a prominent white eyering, and during breeding season, the males will have a black V in their foreheads.

Blue-gray Gnatcatchers frequent oak trees locally, especially Live Oaks. Look for them in preserves with lots of oak trees that have gaps in the foliage cover. Remember, you will hear one before you see it! They can be found in Bluefield Ranch Preserve, Pinelands Preserve, Paleo Hammock Preserve, Savannas Preserve State Park, Oak Hammock Park, and at Oxbow Eco-center.
