Welcome back to our next season for St. Lucie Audubon. Our Board has met in September to get things rolling and update our next season's birding adventures and interesting speakers.



Chapter Dues


The year for local chapter dues runs January to January. Dues can be paid by check or credit card on our Web site: http://stlucieaudubon.org

now the warblers and raptors are passing through. One of our smaller winter visitors is the Yellow-throated Warbler (*Setophaga dominica*). I have had one playing "catch me if you can" in my yard for about three weeks. Note the namesake bright yellow throat patch and distinctive black face connecting to stripes on the sides. The black is offset by a white eye stripe and white ear patch.

The Yellow-throated Warbler is considered a "southeastern" warbler because its breeding range encompasses the southeastern U.S., excluding south Florida. These beautiful birds do winter here in South Florida and can be seen foraging on trees for insects. They creep along branches and trunks, probing in cracks and crevices, often head down! These warblers will also come to bird feeders in the winter for high fat foods—suet, sunflower hearts, and mealworms. I have experienced one determined warbler challenging his reflection in my back slider (see the blurry picture).

The migratory passage of Yellow-throated Warblers is peeking now in St. Lucie County. The numbers will taper off by the end of October. Some of these lively little birds will over-winter here, so keep your eyes open and binoculars ready.

On a positive note, these warblers are expanding their breeding range northward, into the Midwest and Missouri. The birds had retreated from this range in the early twentieth century for unknown reasons. It is good to know that they are coming back!
