• Enter your list(s) online at www.eBird.org. Put in a new checklist: for each new day; for each different location; for the same location, same day, if you counted at a different time of day. You can start entering bird lists at midnight local time on the first day of the count, anywhere in the world.

Project Feederwatch started November 1st and runs through April 29th! You can count the birds that visit your backyard feeders all winter and report these counts to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. 

One of the birds you might spot on a trip to Bluefield Ranch Preserve is the Ruby-crowned Kinglet (*Corthylio calendula*). The Latin name loosely translates to "small bird with a fiery crown." Kinglets are indeed tiny birds; they are smaller than warblers, averaging 3 – 4 inches in total length. And the male Ruby-crowned Kinglet does have a fiery, but seldom seen, crown of feathers.

Ruby-crowned Kinglets are more readily identified by behavior and less subtle field marks. For behavior, they forage almost frantically through shrubs and the lower branches of trees, seldom perching for long. They also constantly flick their wings, which is a key identification clue. Prominent field marks are the bright white eye ring and the single white wingbar. Their overall color is olive-green.

They have a very thin bill and their favorite food is insects. Their frantic foraging is how they glean insects and spiders from the leaves and bark of trees and shrubs. Berries are an occasional food item, and Project Feederwatch states they will come to bird feeders stocked with mealworms.

Because of their tiny size, drab color, and near-constant motion, you must be alert in order to see one of these little beauties. As you walk through the scrub, keep a sharp eye on mid-level branches, especially if you see flying insects in the immediate area. Your reward could just be the wing-flicking of a Ruby-crowned Kinglet.
